# Citizenship Trip to Temple and Mosque

A group of thirteen Year 10 and 11 students went on a very special Citizenship trip to visit a Leicester Hindu temple and a mosque.

As a part of the students GCSE Citizenship curriculum, all students are expected to show a good understanding of other cultures and religions in the UK.

In order to help students build up their awareness of different cultures in our locality, one of our governors facilitated a number of students making the trip to a Leicester temple and mosque to experience worship in very different settings to what they may be used to.

First up was a trip to a Hindu temple. 'We went to a temple,' Vincent Clarridge-Ansell explains, 'and we learnt how they pray with singing and in a different language called Sanskrit.'

Sanskrit is an extremely ancient language that is only used now for prayers and by priests.

The temple was very lively, with a worship session in full swing.



Students were invited to ring the bell, which was a part of the service.

One of the interesting things that the students learned was that Hindus feed their god and dress them and wash them, caring for them as though they were a person.



# And then it was on to the Mosque

In comparison to the temple, the mosque seemed to be very quiet and peaceful. We were welcomed by the imam, who is the person that runs the mosque.

The imam showed us around the mosque, telling us where different things happened.

He also talked about what it is like to live as a Muslim. Even though he was

the imam of a fairly big mosque, he liked to go out and enjoy himself in the evenings, when the evening prayers allowed for it.

Following the visits to the temple and the mosque, we all went to the the Peepul Centre for a curry.

Students really enjoyed the morning out. Year 10 student Declan Breen commented that the 'temple was full of colour and energy'.

'We firstly visited the Hindu temple,' Brook Hutchinson said. 'When we arrived we were shown into a huge room. Inside we watched them pray. They began singing in Sanskrit.'

Jorja Lawson was particularly impressed that Hindus feed their gods. 'We wore hijbas and bindi,' she noted.

Milli-Anne Peach commented that, 'most Muslims have the same life as us but all they do is pray five times a day.

Other than that they have a social life and they do the same thing as us.'

'It was interesting to learn about different religions,' Brandon Lycett said. 'In particular learning about how different religions pray to their gods.'




